# First Reading Hebrews 5:1-10

Please be seated.

A Reading from the Letter to the Hebrews.

Every high priest chosen from among mortals is put in charge of things pertaining to God on their behalf, to offer gifts and sacrifices for sins. He is able to deal gently with the ignorant and wayward, since he himself is subject to weakness; and because of this he must offer sacrifice for his own sins as well as for those of the people. And one does not presume to take this honor, but takes it only when called by God, just as Aaron was.

So also Christ did not glorify himself in becoming a high priest, but was appointed by the one who said to him,

as he says also in another place,


"You are a priest forever, according to the order of Melchizedek."



**The St. John's Choir** is always looking for new members! Although you do not need to be a sight-reading "wiz," we do expect that you know the basics of music reading (i.e., finding your place in a choral score) in order to reap the benefits and contribute to the experience. **Music Notes** Ralph (pronounced "Rafe") Vaughan Williams was the most important English composer in the early 20<sup>th</sup> Century. Despite an avid interest in musical composition, and study at some of the most prestigious colleges in the country, he did not receive much positive encouragement. One of his teachers, the eminent Charles Wood, did not think he would ever make a composer, and a cousin attending Cambridge at the same time wrote about "hearing scraps of conversation about that foolish young man, Ralph Vaughan Williams, who would go on working at music when he was so hopelessly bad at it." He himself knew of his great limitation, but he also was aware that he did not particularly like what was happening in English music at the time. It wasn't until he studied in Europe with Max Bruch and Maurice Ravel that he was able to find his voice. He was the first of his era to bring English compositional style out of the Victorian era and into the modern age, but he did so by looking further backward, firmly embracing the English folk music tradition as well as the great poets of previous eras.

Gabriel Fauré is known today for his *requiem* and for some orchestral music, but he wrote several pieces of religious music for full choir and also for soloists. Throughout his early years he found it difficult to reconcile his composing career with his work as a church organist (he would eventually become chief organist at the Church of the Madeleine in Paris) and his teaching at the Paris Conservatory. The 1890's however, were a particularly fruitful period for him, and that is when he composed the duet heard at communion today.

The tune *Abbot's Leigh* was composed on a Sunday morning in 1941 by Cyril Vincent Taylor, a canon of the Anglican Church who was at the time the Assistant to the Head of Religious Broadcasting of the BBC. They were headquartered during the war in a small village near Bristol called Abbot's Leigh. Since the war, it has become quite popular, and the noted hymnologist Erik Routley has described the tune as one that has an almost "timeless authority that makes one feel as soon as one has heard it that one knew it all one's life." It first appeared in a supplement to the 1940 Hymnal, *Hymns III*, and appears no less than three times in *Hymnal 1982*.
